La Salle's Loss Is St. James' Gain

The Inquirer's high school football ratings underwent a shakeup near the top when La Salle lost to Bishop Kenrick, 21-0, and dropped from No. 2 to No. 15.


Pennsbury won its fifth straight game to remain No. 1. La Salle's spot was taken by St. James, which advanced from No. 3 after thumping St. Joseph's Prep.

Upper Merion, sixth a week ago, won its third straight game to move into third place.

Ridley fell the farthest—from 10th place all the way out of the Top 20—after losing to Radnor, 28-23. Neshaminy won its fourth straight after an opening-game loss to Bishop Egan and jumped from 17th to 11th.

Monsignor Bonner and Malvern Prep remained fourth and fifth respectively, but Abington and Central Bucks West each moved up a notch to sixth and seventh.

Holy Spirit jumped from 11th to eighth, West Catholic remained No. 9 and Plymouth-Whitemarsh rounded out the Top Ten with a leap from 14th place. Kenrick (17), Delsea (18) and Coatesville (20) appeared in the Top 20 for the first time.
